SIDNEY GALLERY PRESENTS



Electrical Project Update

The SMAA has accepted a proposal for the first phase of the electrical repairs to the 202 Sidney Avenue building. The contractor is Olympic Wiring of Silverdale. The price to do the work is \$7500 (plus tax). The work will begin in October and be finished the first part of November.

There will be a minimal impact on the gallery and museum's operating hours, with most of the work being done on Mondays. Project progress, future project ideas and other information about our rewiring will be posted on the Sidney Gallery kitchen for anyone's review.

Theda Cline Peterson has passed. We have lost a treasure. Theda was born and raised in Port Orchard. Except for a couple of years in Seattle, she lived her entire life here. Her family ties go back to the early days of South Kitsap when her parents and grandparents settled in the Long Lake area around 1885. She was fond of saying that she was a cousin related by marriage to just about every pioneer family in the area.

The first time I met Theda I was playing docent at the Log Cabin Museum one Saturday (about 1984). Two little old ladies drove up in an old chevy. The driver (Theda), being rather small, could barely see over the steering wheel, I later learned she had to sit on a cushion.


Out bounded this little bundle of energy, (In all the years I knew her, I never saw Theda move slowly even when she had to use a walker). Theda and her friend came into the museum. Before I could begin to speak, she introduced herself and proceeded to tell me all about her history with the log cabin.

When she and her husband were married they made their first home in the basement of the cabin. This was in 1922. They stayed a year, moved to Seattle, then came back and lived in the main area of the cabin. She took us on a tour of the basement and showed me where the kitchen lean-to had been added on, how the living room also had an addition for more room and where the bathroom was located. When we stood in the area where the bedroom had been, she tugged on my sleeve and stagewhispered "this is where my son was conceived." Witha little laugh she jumped out the door and went back upstairs.

I received a lecture on her family history as it related to South Kitsap. She pointed out which bedroom furnishings were donated by her and which other pieces in the cabin came from her family as well. She said would stop by periodically to see how we were treating these items and she would be more than happy to relate further information (which happily she did over the next twenty years).

Thank you Theda for all the fond memories.
